Shakespeare is one of the few writers who can create interesting and convincing female characters and Rosalind is one of his best. In this production she is being played by Michelle Terry who will be remembered with admiration by anyone who went to see the films of the live performances of "Much Ado about Nothing" and "Love's Labours Lost" from the Royal Shakespeare Theatre at Stratford.

A s readership for British newspapers heads over a steep cliff with plummeting sales the Players' Newslet-



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ter continues to go from strength to strength having increased its circulation by a whopping 10% in its first year.

"Readership for British national newspapers, as estimated by the National Readership Survey, has fallen 13 percent on average compared to the previous year, with particularly bad results for the Independent, Daily Mirror and Guardian" reported the respected trade journal the Media Briefing.

In stark contrast the revamped bulletin has experienced a massive boost in circulation currently boasting a mind boggling readership of thirty-three compared with a mere thirty just 12 months ago.

I do not feature in this tale but my claim to fame that I was the first operator for the machinery in the show. At the time it was revolutionary and no one had heard of an automation operator. This is now a separate trade and there are now many working on most musicals. I was the first.

The tale involves the director Trevor Nunn who you will know and the lighting designer David Hearsy.

David is arguably the most successful lighting designers ever, having lit shows in the West End on Broadway and most of the European opera houses.

They were both seated at their respective production desks in the stalls when lunch was called. David wanted to take the opportunity to do a bit of plotting while the stage was clear and persuaded the board operator to take a late lunch.





He sat there for over an hour plotting just one state adding and subtracting lights, adjusting levels and colours. The result was a lighting state of reds and oranges for the scene in question.

At this point Trevor Nunn came back and was walking up the isle with his back to the stage. David shouted to ask "Trevor what do you think of this for the scene". Trevor without stopping or turning to look said "very nice David, have you got it in blue". Mr Hearsy threw down his cans stormed from the building and was seen no more that day.
